Robert is past Chair of the Florida Bar's Environmental and Land Use law Section and the Florida Section of the Air and Waste Management Association.





What is an Executive Order?

- Directive to Federal Officials and Agencies, which must comply
- Carries the force of law, but not actually a law passed by Congress
- OMB typically assesses budgetary impact
- Published in the Federal Register
- Can be challenged in court

Memos

- Similar to an EO
- Not Required to be Published in the FR, or cite authority
- OMB typically does not assess budget impacts

Proclamations

Typically

Proclamations

- Typically directed to entire Nation for ceremonial occassions
- Can be substantive and apply to individuals

Subjects of Actions

- Executive Orders
 - Revoke prior EOs, Rulemaking
 - GHGs, Energy, Coal, Nuclear, Electric Grid, EJ/DEI
 - Tariffs, Immigration, Drug Prices, AI,
 Education, Law Firms, Water Pressure

Subjects of Actions

- Presidential Memos
 - Repeal Unlawful Rules, Hiring Freeze, Immigration
- Proclamations
 - MATS extension, Ceremonial
- Guidance
 - Mainly to implement other Actions

Purpose and Basis

- Constitution and Existing Statutes
- Executive Orders, Memos
 - National and Economic Security,
 Emergencies, Caselaw
- Proclamations
 - Specific Statutes (e.g., CAA provision for MATs extension)

Finality and Impacts

- General Provisions. (a) Nothing in this order shall be construed to impair or otherwise affect:
 - (i) the authority granted by law to an executive department or agency, or the head thereof; or
 - (ii) the functions of the Director of the Office of Management and Budget relating to budgetary, administrative, or legislative proposals.
 - (b) This order shall be implemented consistent with applicable law and subject to the availability of appropriations;
 - (c) This order is not intended to, and does not, create any right or benefit, substantive or procedural, enforceable at law or in equity by any party against the United States, its departments, agencies, or entities, its officers, employees, or agents, or any other person.

Litigation

- Numerous Legal Challenges to Actions
 - Typically, arguing that Action exceeds
 Constitutional or Statutory authority
 - Hundreds of ongoing Challenges to Actions
 - 15-state challenge to Jan 20, 2024, "National Energy Emergency"
